Thought for Sunday 28th February from Rev Canon Dr John Hall



'Then he called the crowd to him along with his disciples and said: "Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me."' Mark 8.34

We're more than a week into Lent. Today's Bible readings tell us the story of Abraham and Sarah to whom God made a promise, and through them to all nations, to all peoples and for all time. The people were told to obey God and in return God would guide them and protect them. There was the particular promise of descendants for the couple, of a land for the Jewish nation, and the assurance of God's blessing and redemption.

In his letter to the early church in Rome, St Paul picked up on the significance of the promise of redemption made to Abraham. He reminds these Christians they stand in line to receive the same promise of redemption made to Abraham all those centuries before. Paul says it is because of faith Abraham was counted righteous before God and that by faith we too are counted as righteous in God's eyes.

We share in the promises and love of God and are called to grow in love. God's love is agape love, which means love in action, not just words. Lent is when we examine ourselves, ponder on the things of God and indeed "take up our cross" in part to check out how well we are doing.

The phrase "take up our cross" is one that has acquired many meanings. For some it is a burden of life they carry with them. For others a heart-felt desire to press on doing the right thing even though it is costly and maybe misunderstood. But what does it mean to you, to take up your cross, I wonder?

For me, the main thought I have is that I need to die a little to selfish desires and be increasingly open to the loving purposes of God whatever they might be. I believe God is present and active and intervenes in his world, not least through his followers. He desires to change things for good and calls us to change too that we might be more closely aligned with his will.

Today it is time to ponder afresh what it means to "take up our cross".

Following the Prime Minister's statement to the Commons on Monday, the Bishop of London issued the following response on behalf of the Church of England:

"The Government has asked us to stay at home to save lives and protect the NHS. Under the current regulations the Government has permitted public worship to continue, if it is safe to do so.

While many churches have decided to offer digital services only for the time being, others are continuing to remain open, in a Covid-secure way, for individual prayer and public worship. The circumstances in each place will inform a local decision.

We urge everyone to be exceptionally cautious and, in particular, to do everything possible to prevent mingling outside of households and support bubbles.

We acknowledge and share the sadness many are feeling at not being able to meet together as we would usually do at the moment and prayerfully and confidently look forward to better times ahead."

Review of Church Services by the PCC

The Bishop of Exeter has extended all the dispensations for church closure which were given to churches in the diocese who sought permission in January. This extension now runs until March 29th. Taking into account that extended permission and Government guidance given on February 22nd, our PCC have agreed, after much thought and prayer, that our church should continue to stay closed for Sunday worship and Morning Prayer up to March 29th.

This decision was based on the clear message given by the Government to prevent any mixing of households before this date and to ensure everyone of all ages in our church stays safe. We will be continuing with our current church opening for Private Prayer, on Wednesday and Friday mornings from 10am to noon and we are very grateful to the people who enable this to take place each week, as well as those creating our online reflections.

We hope to open again as soon as the next phase in the lessening of Government restrictions is announced, potentially on March 29th. That would mean that we could begin Morning Prayer on Wednesday March 31st, and for Easter Week, have our hour of Reflection in church on Good Friday and our services at 7am and 10am on Easter day.

After that we plan to hold a weekly Sunday service in church at 10am.
