#### "Advent Waiting"

#### Thoughts for this Sunday from the Ven. Andrew Beane, Archdeacon of Exeter

All of us are waiting for this terrible virus to go, or at least to know when things might begin to get back to what we are calling the 'new normal'. Waiting is part of life. Waiting for that package to arrive that we ordered online at record speed. Waiting in line at the self-checkout at the supermarket, designed to eliminate the evils of waiting. Waiting for that great job to come along; or waiting for that elusive perfect relationship. The waiting seems to never end. Researchers tell us that the average person will spend 5 years of his or her life waiting in line, 2 years playing telephone tag, and six months sitting at red lights. That is over 7 and a half years of waiting, at best doing nothing, or at worst experiencing great aggravation! The bottom line is that even in our fast-paced world, with post modern conveniences, we are all waiting for something. However, as strange as it sounds, during the Advent season, we discover a purpose to our waiting. Let me explain.

You think we have it rough, how about waiting thousands of years, not for something minor like groceries, but for the king whose eternal reign would end the oppression of the world? What do we think about thousands of people hoping and praying fervently for something miraculous to happen, while successive generations are born and pass away, without a hint of fulfilment? I am speaking here of the ancient Hebrew patriarchs, kings, prophets, and priests, who waited expectantly for the coming of the Messiah. The prophet Isaiah expresses this hope:

It shall come to pass in the latter days that the mountain of the house of the Lord shall be established as the highest of the mountains, and shall be raised above the hills; and all the nations shall flow to it, and many peoples shall come, and say: "Come, let us go up to the mountain of the Lord...He shall judge between the nations, and shall decide for many peoples; and they shall beat their swords into ploughshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more. (Isaiah 2:2-5, RSV).

Then, hundreds of years later, born in Bethlehem, a small town in the Roman Empire, their hope is finally realized, but with a twist, because Jesus is not the earthly warrior-king many expected. And this is only the beginning of the story. All of this makes our own waiting seem pretty insignificant. Somehow waiting five extra minutes for a bus; standing waiting in the queue to pay a cheque in at the bank; or waiting for that all too familiar call of "Cashier number two please" doesn't feel so important anymore. So whilst you are waiting why not take a moment to reflect, to pause, and to slow down, and in the run up to Christmas contemplate all we have to be thankful for.

Church Corporation Appointments - It is with much pleasure we can announce Ian Godfrey and Simon Lowne have recently been appointed Assistant Governors. Both gentlemen live in the town and were chosen from a list of fourteen female and male likely/possible candidates to fill the two vacancies. By Letters Patent dated the 24th December 1545, Henry VIII completed the dissolution of the college and decreed there should be four local residents as governors and that they should have succession for ever. In 1552, Edward VI ordered the governors to appoint eight others to be associated for their assistance. This constitution continues to the present day. It is interesting to note that the only other Churches in the South West having governors are at Crediton and Wimborne Minster. In David Roberts we have an excellent Clerk and appreciate all the hard work he does on our behalf. At present the four Governors are:myself as Chair, Richard Coley (Vice Chair), Graham Ward and John Akers.
